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Executive Summary

This document is a record of the design and consultation process for Woodsdale Packinghouse Waterfront Park. The Concept Plan was prepared in 2009 by Stantec Consulting under the direction of the District of Lake Country's Parks and Recreation Committee (PARC) and with input from the public.

The 3.2 hectare (7.9 acre) site (Lot 1 pl 2766) is located near the corner of Woodsdale Road and Oyama Road on the south shore of Wood Lake and immediatley adjacent a CN Railway line. The Concept Plan is subject to further review following completion of archaeological, environmental and habitat studies.

Project Background

The property is currently owned by the District of Lake Country. Historical land use was light industrial and was home to the SunRype Fruit Packinghouse for several decades until it burnt to the ground in the early 1990's.

The site is now used as an informal passive recreational space with a large area of grassland, a willow dominated shoreline and a backshore wetland area. Two drainage channels occur on the site – along the east and west boundaries.

An Osprey nesting platform on the western boundary of the site is currently being used by Canada Geese. A second platform is located off-site just east of the railway.

The District of Lake Country has identified the property as a suitable location for new tennis courts. Although other potential sites for the tennis courts were considered all were eliminated for the following reasons:

- Swalwell Park not enough room, would have to eliminate a playing field
- Winfield Recreation Centre would have to purchase land or eliminate ball field (also future home of second ice sheet)
- Beasley Park would require elimination of field area
- George Elliot School School District advised that the vacant grassed area to the north of the existing school is identified as future building expansion

The Parks and Recreation Committee (PARC) reviewed all the sites and decided that the best location for the tennis courts is on the Woodsdale Packinghouse site and passed the following resolution on May 25, 2009:

That PARC recommend to Council that the Tennis Courts be placed in the Woodsdale Packinghouse site. Bauhart/Templeton Carried.

The District applied for a Towns for Tommorrow grant in late 2008 for the construction of four new tennis courts and the District received approval of this grant in Spring 2009. Following the securing of funding for the courts the District commissioned Stantec Consulting in early 2009 to undertake preliminary design and community consultation to determine the future programs, facilities, and character of the whole property.

Preliminary program and facility suggestions were:

- playing fields on level areas of site, space permitting
- on-site parking
- site lighting
- interface treatment of adjacent functioning rail line
- packing house interpretive themeing and possible public art placement
- playground area
- wetland boardwalk and possible staircase
- boardwalk trail and promontory overlook
- public beach improvements with connecting trails
- washroom /change rooms

A public workshop was held on May 4, 2009 to explore community ideas and requirements for the new park, the results of which guided the drafting of two sketch options that were submitted to PARC for consideration.

PARC selected the option including a 4 court layout on the southern portion of the property and this was further developed into the concept plan that was presented at a public information event on the July 16, 2009.

Additional public feedback was received resulting in some minor revisions to arrive at the final concept plan and Preliminary Opinion of Probable Cost, dated August 7, 2009. Recommendations & Further Studies

The current concept plan provides a concept framework intended to guide the District in the planning and phasing of detailed design and construction.

Additional studies required to allow finalization of the concept plan are:

- Archaeological Stage 1 Assessment
- Environmental Phase 1 Assessment
- Habitat Assessment

Following these studies additional refinement of the design may be required to ensure protection of any areas of significant archaeological or habitat significance and to address any remediation required should contamination from past land use activities be identified.

The proposed visitor center and tennis pavilion are opportunities to demonstrate the latest in green design approaches and it is recommended that the District considers initiatives such as (but not limited to):

- Grey water recycling, composting toilets & wetland filtration systems
- Rainwater harvesting
- Optimal solar orientation with solar heating systems
- Micro wind turbines & photovoltaic energy generation
- Bio-gas production for heating and/or cooking purposes
- Green roof and wall strategies to reduce heat loading during summer months
- Emphasis of using local and renewable materials

Construction Phasing

The proposed phasing of the project follows:

- Year 1 At conclusion of the additional studies, undertake detailed design for tennis courts and ancillary landscaping. Undertake any remediation works required by the environmental studies. Construction of the tennis courts, with earth berms and buffer planting, boundary fence, sidewalk extension along Woodsdale Road and roadside parking area.
- Year 2-3 Undertake detailed design for the entire park and pre-design for the buildings and structures Undertake rough and fine grading of building platforms, plazas and any constructed or enhanced wetland areas. Begin enhancement planting and weed control measures throughout the park, installation of water and sewer lines (if required) to future buildings.

- Year 3-4 Continue enhancement planting, construction of entry road and main car parking area, and associated tree and shrub plantings. Install composting toilet stations at site of future visitor center. Construct main pathway linkages from the road to the future visitor center plaza and pathways and boardwalk connections along the western boundary to provide access to the beach picnic area.
- Year 4-5 Construct school commuter/walk around lake country trail connection to just north of the first wetland zone. Construct the secondary pathway connection and boardwalk connection through the wetland and willow area to the beach picnic area. Construct the outdoor classroom and tennis court plaza areas.
- Year 5-6 Extend school commuter/walk around lake country trail connection north if there is funding to extend the walkway north beyond the site. Construct shade pavilions and viewing decks. Undertake detailed design for tennis pavilion and visitor centre.
- Year 6-7 Construct visitor centre and surrounding plaza and deck area, construct lookout path and seating area.
- Year 7-8 Construct tennis pavilion building.
- Year 8-9 Install public art pieces and any remaining site furniture elements and signage.

Servicing Options.

Given the proposed location of the visitor centre approximately 150m north of Woodsdale Road a hydrant will be required necessitating a 150mm (6 inch) water line connection. Water supply maybe provided by:

- Extended municipal service from Woodsdale Road
- Onsite well (provided sufficient flow rates and suitable quality of water is available)
- Private utility (if there is service and sufficient capacity from an adjacent property)

Should sewer connection be required this will be a 100mm (4 inch) line (assuming it can be gravity fed). There is also the opportunity to explore on site treatment options such as composting toilets or package treatment plants.

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
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PRELIMINARY SCHEMATIC DESIGN

- I think the layout and functionality is excellent. The main focus of the land adjacent to Wood Lake MUST be conservation.
